Family Invitations/Sharing projects

One of the biggest changes to class sharing time this year was the elimination of a due date or specific sharing day for each child. The word invitation means optional, so that took pressure off parents in their busy lives. I hope that this way, the child will go home and ask the parent to help them complete it, if it's something they really wanted to share. The focus of these activities was to give us all a closer glimpse into each other's lives.

"We are constantly and intently on the watch for reflections of our own life on the plane of other people's consciousness..." (Bakhtin 1920/1990, as cited in Miller Marsh & Turner-Vorbeck, 2010, p. 97).

It is important that teachers work on "developing and implementing curricula that are sensitive to the lived experiences of all children and their families...providing activities that include multiple story lines...from which children can draw..." (Miller Marsh & Turner-Vorbeck, 2010, p. 103).

Family Shield: Open Ended (suggestion, foods, travel, activities, picture)

Family Recipe: Open-ended activity. Some took photos, some drew pictures, and all made us hungry! The children told us how to make the food and shared the pictures on the Smartboard.

December Family Invitation This could be sent after the Christmas break. It was nice for the class to see what traditions they had in common with their classmates, and what was unique about each family's celebration.

• The arts teach children that problems can have **MORE** than **ONE** solution and that questions can have more than one answer.



- The arts celebrate multiple **PERSPECTIVES.** One of their large lessons is that there are many ways to **SEE** and **INTERPRET** the world.
- The Arts teach students to think through and within a material. All art forms employ some means through which **IMAGES** become **REAL**.
- The arts help **CHILDREN LEARN** to say what cannot be said. When children are invited to disclose what a work of art helps them **FEEL**, they must reach into their **POETIC CAPACITIES** to find the words that will do the job.
- The **ARTS ENABLE** us to have **EXPERIENCE** we can have from no other source and through such experience to **DISCOVER** the range and variety of what we are capable of **FEELING**.

Dear Kindergarten Families,


