### Create a Visual Schedule with Student Photographs

I created a daily schedule to post in my Pre-kindergarten room. I used a pocket chart to organize the words and pictures. I found that using real photographs helped the children relate to the daily events and they began to recognize and read our day plan. In addition, I made sure to have all the students who struggle with transitions in each picture and it seemed to help them to change activities easier.

# **Student Symbols**

In my Pre-kindergarten class, I have created a list of symbols that I use for developing early literacy with the children. Each year the students get to pick their own symbol from the list. 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#### Planbookedu

After consulting with a colleague, we decided that instead of using a traditional, paper, day book, we would look online to see what options there were for online daybooks. We found quite a few options, but nothing that really seemed to fit our needs. We wanted something that we could access from any computer, one that would autofill spaces from week to week, or daily, depending on what we were teaching, and something that would allow us to insert Saskatchewan outcomes without having to retype them. The one that seemed closest was planbookedu. The problem with planbookedu is that it is American, so it has American standards saved in a database, but not our SK outcomes. We emailed them and they told us that they would be willing to add in our outcomes, but unfortunately they had no date to when this would be completed as they were backlogged. They showed me how I could insert my own outcomes and share them publically so that other teachers could search for them and use them. It took me about an hour to input all the Kindergarten outcomes. Currently, teachers have added in SK kindergarten, some grade 2, and some senior math outcomes.

There is a free daybook available, but in order to get all of the features that I wanted, the cost is \$25/year. This fee includes things like, the ability to insert outcomes, the ability to print, email and share your day book and the ability to imbed things like movies, powerpoints, etc into your daybook.
